Don't tell your parents about stuff like fights or anything.

He didn't impress me as a player or anything.

It didn't have to be jazz or anything, if a guy was a good player he would ask them to join the band.

Don't worry about the condiments or anything if you want the process to go quickly.

Don't worry about the condiments or anything if you want the process to go quickly.

I never would have known about ballet or anything if it wasn't for my grandmother.

I didn't cry or anything.

She didn't choke or anything.

He doesn't moan loudly or anything.

She wasn't freaking out or anything.

Not that she's showing off or anything.

Sales haven't plateaued or dropped off or anything, and plenty of folks are still buying new games.

We didn't move out or anything, that would have been too expensive.

My chicken doesn't squawk or anything when it's walking.

Don't shove or force anything, if he isn't hungry or thirsty.

It doesn't mean I have to like him or anything.

It's not because I, like, care or anything.

He barely yells or anything.

Don't change the way you walk, eat, talk or anything.

Don't bother drawing eyes on it or anything.

It wasn't tears coming down or anything.

Nothing is written down on paper or anything.

Actually, I do have a strange pain in my knee, and I can't remember banging it or anything.

I can't stand sitting in a waiting room or standing in a queue or anything, I just go berserk, you know.

I never get drunk to the point of throwing up or anything.

I don't think it was about keeping up appearances or anything.

I had no intention of burning down the house or anything.

They had no intention of running off or leaving or anything.

People say they can come in here and not worry about getting in a fight or anything.

I have to talk to my parents, I haven't thought about leaving or anything.

I didn't get angry or anything.

They screws weren't loose or anything.

Not that I'm unhappy or anything.

Nobody has gotten violent or anything.

I'm not bitter about it or anything.

Send out a mass E-mail, but don't make it cheesy or anything.

I realize "get rid of" might sound a little aggressive, but rest assured I don't mean in a Fahrenheit 451 manner or anything.

I laughed and she actually giggled, but not happily or anything.

We won't drop in unexpectedly or anything.

The ink is pretty opaque and it doesn't seem to dry out quickly or anything.

Dazu gehören auch Adverb-wertige Phrasen ("adverbial phrases"):

Don't expect much on the first date or anything, because if your expectations are too high, you will only be disappointed.

You don't need to use them in context or anything, just say them as if you know what they mean.

I didn't get home at 3 o'clock or anything, it was much earlier.

Apparently he just didn't mean they'd do it in a hurry or anything.

2.1.5. Anstatt Satz:

Maybe I should write him a note to say thank you – it's not because I fancy him or anything; simple good manners demands it.

Nobody died or anything.

We never had any fights or anything.

It wasn't that I didn't want it or anything.

"I didn't see a specialist on it or anything," Roberts said.

I didn't talk her into it or anything.

She can do anything to it she likes – get it dirty or anything.

It should not matter what you look like, what size you are, what color you are, who you are, how much money your family has, what you do, what you represent, what you believe in, or anything.

I'm not like a total recluse who lives in the woods or anything.

No flags went up or shots were fired or anything.

I went on a health-conscious diet, though I didn't cut down on my food or anything.

I haven't been out or anything.

Don't say you don't like them or anything.

Es gibt auch verneinte Sätze, in denen "or something" steht. Es scheint, dass sich die englische Sprache zum Zweck der Präzisierung / Verdeutlichung / näheren Definition auch die Option mit "some" offenhält. Hier treffen zwei unterschiedliche Konzepte von "some vs. any" aufeinander: Einerseits die Verneinung – diese erfordert "any" - , aber anderseits die Idee der Präzisierung und genaueren alternativen Betrachtung eines Sachverhalts, was besser zu "some" passt, welches für real existierende Dinge zuständig ist.

I don't know how you'd get the word out or something.

"Or something" meint eine (reale) Alternative zu "get the word out".

They're not making fun of them or something.

"Or something" meint eine (reale) Alternative zu "making fun of them".

I don't want to pop an artery or something.

"Or something" meint eine Alternative zu "pop an artery" – also eine reale Möglichkeit.

I never just wanted to be 200th in the world or something, I wanted to be at the top.

Es geht um die Verdeutlichung eines Platzes unter ferner liefen.

We didn't want it to be <u>black curtains or something</u> – we wanted to actually have some motion and personality. *Es geht um die Verdeutlichung von "black curtains"*.

"I don't think it is a crisis or something," he said.

Es geht um eine Alternative zu "crisis".

"I'm just glad that firstly I'm safe and that it's happened now, not when we're in the season or something," said Hamilton [= motor racing champion].

"Or something" meint hier ungefähr: "oder anderweitig voll beschäftigt" = Alternative zu "season".

We can be disappointed by failing an exam or if our children aren't doing the dishes or something. "Anything" würde den Sinn verändern – dann würden die Kinder überhaupt nichts tun. (Da würde jedenfalls der Aspekt der Negation überwiegen.) Hier bezeichnet das "or something" aber eine alternative Haushaltspflicht der

Kinder.

We're not a little Detroit or something.

"Anything" würde bedeuten, dass wir gar nichts sind – es geht aber um eine Alternative zu "Detroit".

It does feel like they don't want them there or something.

Die Verneinung bezieht sich hier nur auf eines von mehreren möglichen Gefühlen ("want them there"); das "or something" ist aber abhängig von "It does feel like …", was nicht verneint ist. Es besteht also gar kein Grund für ein "anything".

{"I don't know, I guess I'm not sweet enough or something," said Olivares. Though he wasn't sure why, Olivares said he just does not get bit [by mosquitoes].}

Die Verneinung von "not sweet enough" hat mit "or something nichts zu tun – letzteres gehört zu "I guess", was nicht verneint ist – es besteht also gar kein Grund für "anything".

2.2. "Or anything" bei Fragen:

Did he leave a message or anything?

Did you have a nickname or anything?

"Did you pick him up or anything?" she asked them.

So he didn't give you a hard time or anything?

Did you say anything to her to try to get her to get up or talk to you or anything?

Did he ever write to you or send you money or anything?

Is he in any trouble or anything?

Can you check for fingerprints or anything?

"What about Meline? She isn't sick or anything?" asked Mr. Ferguson.

You didn't read anything in the paper about any of this murder or anything?

Didn't you ever join a band or anything?

I have a drill, but will I need to buy additional screws or anything?

And he wasn't mad or upset or anything?

These robots can't walk or anything?

"No missed calls on your phone from unknown numbers or anything?" asked Dudzik.

Did anyone try to pressure you or anything?

And you didn't lie to the prosecutor because you cut a deal so you wouldn't be charged with murder or anything?

"We're not having trouble paying bills or anything?" asked Committeeman Stephen Lee.

"Did you ever make the spectre speak or squeak, or anything?" asked Angus, with some interest. (C. K. Chesterton)

1. In (Entscheidungs)fragen, die nicht "offen" sind, wo also der Fragesteller eine bejahte Antwort erwartet, steht "something":

{Are you ill or something?" - "No, I'm not ill. Never felt better - physically." - "Then what is it?}

Say, are you drunk or something?

You sick or something?

Have you gone out of your mind or something?

Don't you have homework to do or something?

{Why are you so grumpy? Have you had a bad week or something?}

{"Are you unhappy or something?" - "Why do I have to be unhappy just because I want to go home?" she snapped at me.}

"Are you with a magazine or something?" he asked as he noticed a reporter, notebook in hand, coming his way.

Don't you want to be a doctor or something?

Maybe the colour is just a side effect or something?

"Don't you have a mobile or something," asked Adam, "so I can keep in touch more regularly?

"Are you in a bad mood or something?" asked Rocky.

{Viewers and Good Morning Britain presenters were left in tears of laughter today after Chris Kamara admitted he didn't have any trousers on. The truth came to light when Kammy - as he is known - was asked to show off his

fitness skills. "Can't you do a handstand up the wall or something?" asked presenter Ben Shephard.}
Could you move it or something?' asked the girl. 'I don't think so,' said Archie. He was not very big and it was quite a heavy piano.

Julian also makes fun of August's face and says "Were you in a fire or something? What's the deal with your face?" "Makes fun of" gibt den Ton vor: Julian tut so, als ob Augusts Gesicht durch Hitzeeinwirkung gelitten hätte.

{"Are you being punished or something?" asked the first girl. I chuckled because at that point it was starting to feel like she might be right.}

"Aren't you guys supposed to wait for marriage or something?" asked my subtly racist friend from New York.

While the room burst into giggles, I pondered over how people have preconceived notions about other cultures and the fact that nothing has been done to substantially change these beliefs.

The evidence is all around you – are you blind or something? (R. Dahl) Dieser Satz ist ironisch gemeint – zwar kann sich der Sprecher da kein "ja" als Antwort von seinem Gesprächspartner erwarten, aber er ist überzeugt davon, dass dieser etwas übersehen hat. Ähnlich: {Can't you see it? Are you blind or something?}

Die Formulierung, dass "eine bejahte Antwort erwartet" wird, ist in vielen Grammatikbüchern anzutreffen.

Tatsächlich sollte man eher sagen: Wenn der Sprecher einen Sachverhalt als gegeben annimmt, dann wird auch in einer Frage "some" verwendet. Insofern handelt es sich in solchen Fällen nicht um eine Ausnahme zu der Regel "In Fragesätzen steht 'any'", sondern um vielmehr um einen Anwendungsfall der Grundregel "'Some' steht, wenn etwas als tatsächlich / gegeben angenommen wird".

2. Die Beispiele im Punkt 1. fallen alle in die Kategorie eines vermuteten (d.h. als gegeben angenommenen) Sachverhalts. Das dort vorgefundene "or something" lässt sich aber auch noch anders begründen (im Punkt 1. können wir somit gleich auf zwei verschiedene Begründungen zurückgreifen), nämlich mit einem häufig vorkommenden "or something" auch in solchen Fragesätzen, wo KEINE bejahende Antwort erwartet wird:

Ein "or something" in offenen Entscheidungsfragen (wo also auch ein "nein" als Antwort möglich ist) dient dazu, etwas näher zu definieren oder zu verdeutlichen. Und zu dieser Idee der Klärung / Präzisierung passt grundsätzlich "some" besser als "any", welches ja für Negation und Zweifel zuständig ist.

Nota bene: Dieser Erklärungsversuch ist eine Hypothese des Verfassers und steht (seines Wissens) in keinem Grammatikbuch.

Den nachfolgenden Beispielen mit "or something" in Entscheidungsfragen stehen jedoch die Beispiele aus 2.2. entgegen, wo "or anything" verwendet wird, obwohl es sich ebenfalls um Präzisierung handelt. Es scheint sich um einen Bereich der Grammatik zu handeln, wo sich die Sprache nicht für eine einheitliche Regelung entschieden hat.

What did you guys do to make her angry – did you laugh or something?

Hier geht es bei "or something" nicht darum, ob die "guys" überhaupt etwas gemacht haben (das setzt der Sprecher bereits voraus, wenn er sagt "What did you guys do ..."), sondern darum, was sie gemacht haben – also gelacht oder sonst etwas > es handelt sich also um eine Präzisierung: nicht um "laugh – yes or no? sondern um "laugh – or something else?"

"I mean," he says, examining his hands belatedly, "did I have dirty fingers or something?"

Wie "belatedly" vermuten lässt, wird der Sprecher auf irgendeinen Sachverhalt aufmerksam (gemacht) und versucht, diesen näher zu ergründen: Waren es vielleicht seine schmutzigen Finger, oder doch etwas anderes? Eine erwartete bejahende Antwort auf die Frage nach "dirty fingers" wäre hier die falsche Erklärung – der Sprecher ist sich ja dieser "dirty fingers" selber gar nicht sicher. Es geht hier bei dem "or something" nicht um die Entscheidungsfrage "dirty fingers – yes or no?" sondern um eine Präzisierung: Wenn es nicht die Finger waren, was dann?

Could the monster not have taken his ear off or something?

Wieso sollte der Fragesteller das Monster sozusagen präjudizieren, indem er eine bejahende Antwort erwartet? Hier geht es bei "or something" nicht um "Verstümmelung ja oder nein?", sondern um deren Art und Weise, also um eine Verdeutlichung.

Why wasn't Joseph taking her sister out anymore, Jory wondered back in her bedroom – was he broke or something?

Jory spekuliert über ein Motiv. Mit "Ja oder nein?" hat das nichts zu tun, denn das Vorhandensein eines Motivs wird bereits als gegeben angenommen, Jory versucht bloß, es zu identifizieren.

What do you think I am – dumb or something?

Eine bejahende Antwort wird sich der Sprecher vermutlich nicht erwarten – es geht um eine nähere Erklärung von "dumb".

We didn't know what was about to happen – were we about to get in trouble or something?

Aus "We didn't know" geht schon hervor, dass es sich um eine offene Frage handelt (d.h., sowohl "ja" also auch "nein" sind möglich) – es geht um eine Alternative zu "get in trouble".

Do you write down every one of these purchases in a ledger or something?

Ob "ja" oder "nein" bleibt offen – es geht um die Art der Dokumentation.

"Did you used to do basketball or something?" asked Akiko with an eager expression.

Ob "ja" oder "nein" bleibt offen – es geht um die Art des ausgeübten Sports.

"Do you think there's a possibility she might have left with the boyfriend or gone for a drive or something?" asked the dispatcher.

Ob "ja" oder "nein" bleibt offen – es geht um den Grund für ihre Abwesenheit.

"What kind of fish are the other ones? Piranhas or something?" asked Joe.

Ob "ja" oder "nein" bleibt offen – es geht um die Spezies der Fische.

Should I lie down on the couch or something?" asked Jason.

Ob "ja" oder "nein" bleibt offen – es geht darum die Art der Handlung.

"Are you all going to have a revival or something?" asked a repairman working nearby. — "No revival. Just summer camp."

Ob "ja" oder "nein" bleibt offen – es geht um die Art der Veranstaltung.

"What is it going to take, somebody to get killed or hurt or something?" asked West Irvine resident Bonnie Sue Grant.

Ob "ja" oder "nein" bleibt offen – es geht um die Art der Verletzung.

"Crap, is the battery dead or something?" asked Miruna. "Lemme check..." said Austin. He hopped out of the car along with Andrew and Ryan.

Miruna erwartet kein "ja" – sie fragt nach der genauen Ursache der Autopanne.

You're asking a lot of questions, are you with the FBI or something?" asked a blonde woman with an accent observing our conversation.

Zwar hegt die Fragestellerin einen Verdacht, aber über die Organisation ist sie sich nicht sicher – um die Klärung dieser Frage geht es.

"Are they giving away food or something?" asked a man passing on a bicycle.

Irgendetwas ist los, aber was genau? Danach erkundigt sich der Radfahrer.

I mean, can't you ... you know ... sue him or something?

Ob "ja" oder "nein" bleibt offen – es geht um die Art der Wiedergutmachung.

"Some girl called Mia, or something?" said Aiden.

Die Unklarheit besteht im Namen des Mädchens, nicht darin, ob es sich überhaupt um ein Mädchen handelt – es ist also keine Entscheidungsfrage zwischen "ja" und "nein".

What does she want me to do, be in two places at once or something?

Auf so eine Frage kann man vernünftiger Weise keine bejahende Antwort erwarten – vielmehr geht es bei diesem "something" um den Sachverhalt einer unmöglichen Erwartung, der als gegeben angenommen wird. Die Verdeutlichung wird hier in ironischer Weise vorgenommen.

Do you have a black dress or something?

Hier handelt es sich um eine offene Frage, die also sowohl "ja" als auch "nein" als Antwort zulässt. Trotzdem steht "something" und nicht "anything", weil es nicht um "Besitz – ja oder nein?" geht. Die Wahl von "or something" bedeutet z.B.: "Hast du vielleicht ein schwarzes Kleid oder eine vergleichbare Trauer- / Festtagskleidung?" Es geht nicht um "Haben oder nicht haben?", sondern um die Präzisierung eines bestimmten Gegenstands.

Do you have a dinner reservation or something?" the waiter asked.

Das ist eine eindeutig offene Frage – der Kellner hat keinen Grund, ein "ja" zu erwarten. Trotzdem steht "something", weil es nicht um "Haben oder nicht haben?" geht, sondern um die Art der Legitimation.

"Are you Indian or something?" she asked.

Die Fragestellerin will vermutlich dem exotischen Äußeren ihrer Gesprächspartnerin auf den Grund gehen. Das ist keine "ja" – "nein" Frage, sondern eine der Verdeutlichung.

Is he going to beat me up or something?

Vermutlich steht auch hier nicht eine erwartete bejahende Antwort im Hintergrund, sondern es geht um die Präzisierung einer (möglichen) Gewalttätigkeit.

Did he overdose or something?

Hier geht es bei "or something" um die Todesursache, also um eine Präzisierung des Todes, obwohl die Formulierung die einer offenen Frage ("ja" oder "nein"?) ist.

"Is this Halloween or something?" the man asks her.

Wir dürfen annehmen, dass der Fragesteller das Datum von Halloween kennt. (Und dass eben gerade nicht Halloween ist, weil die Frage vermutlich rhetorisch oder sarkastisch gemeint ist.) Offenbar möchte er wissen, was für einen Grund es für einen besonderen Sachverhalt gibt, der ihm auffällig erscheint.

{"Are you his guardian angel or something?" asked the bully. "Stay out of it and you will get to go home unharmed . . . you hear?"}

Offenbar wird hier nicht die Antwort "ja" erwartet – es geht um die Verdeutlichung von "guardian angel".

Will the boss give us a password or something?

Die Antwort ist unbestimmt – sie kann "ja" oder "nein" lauten. Es geht um die Präzisierung der Zugangsberechtigung.

What are you, an engineer or something?

Es geht um die Präzisierung des Berufes.

What's she looking for, a fucking medal or something?

Offenbar hat der Sprecher einen Verdacht – es geht aber bei "or something" um dessen Präzisierung, nicht um "ja" oder "nein".

3. Im Punkt 1. betrachteten wir Beispiele, wo der Sprecher einen Sachverhalt als gegeben ansah. Der Punkt 2. betraf Fälle, wo dies nicht der Fall war und trotzdem "something" und nicht "anything" zwecks Präzisierung verwendet wurde – ungeachtet der Frage. Es folgen nun sozusagen intermediäre Beispiele, wo beide Erklärungen denkbar sind:

Is it not magenta or something?" she said.

Hier könnte sich die Sprecherin eine bejahende Antwort erwarten – es wäre aber auch möglich, dieses "something" nicht auf den ganzen Satz, sondern nur auf "magenta" zwecks Präzisierung zu beziehen: "Ist es nicht magenta oder eine ähnliche Farbe?"

Isn't it black comedy or historical satire or something?

Auch hier sind wieder zwei Interpretationen möglich: Erstens eine erwartete bejahenden Antwort, und zweitens eine Verdeutlichung der Literaturgattung.

Don't they live in caves or something?

Auch hier sind wieder zwei Interpretationen möglich: Erstens bejahende Antwort erwartet und zweitens Präzisierung: "in Höhlen oder auf eine andere urtümliche / ungewöhnlichen Art?"

I've been calling you for the past hour – have you been out or something?

Wieder sind zwei Interpretationen möglich: Erstens bejahende Antwort erwartet und zweitens Präzisierung: "Warst du fort, oder warst du auf andere Weise verhindert, mein Telefonat anzunehmen?"

"Don't they have potatoes or something?" he asked.

Das könnte eine Frage sein, wo ein "ja" erwartet wird. Alternativ könnte es auch um "Kartoffel oder so etwas in der Art" gehen, also um eine Präzisierung.

"You an angel or something?" asked Sully.

Offenbar erwartet sich Sully eine bejahende Antwort – aber auch wahrscheinlich eine Alternative zu "angel".

"Can't you tell some kind of jokes or something?" she asked.

Das könnte eine Frage sein, wo ein "ja" erwartet wird. Alternativ könnte es auch bedeuten: "Witze erzählen oder Zauberkunststücke vorführen oder Grimassen schneiden etc.", also eine Präzisierung eines Talents bzw. einer Unterhaltungsvorführung.

"You a public speaker or something?" the man asked.

Entweder wird hier eine bejahende Antwort erwartet, oder es wird eine nähere Definition des Berufes erfragt.

Is she a prostitute or something?

Hier steht "something" nicht notwendigerweise, weil der Frager eine bejahende Antwort erwartet – obwohl auch das ein mögliches Szenario wäre. Eine Alternative wäre die Interpretation "Ist sie etwa eine Prostituierte oder so etwas in der Art?" Es ginge dann um die Präzisierung einer bestimmten Eigenschaft / Tätigkeit.

"Can't you open a window or something?" I asked.

Hier gibt es sogar drei Interpretationsmöglichkeiten: Erstens: Antwort "ja" erwartet. Zweitens: Verdeutlichung von "window" alleine: also Fenster oder Türe oder Oberlichte oder Klappe etc. öffnen. Drittens: Verdeutlichung von "open a window": z.B. zum Zweck der Lüftung Fenster öffnen – oder vielleicht Gebläse einschalten?

Nobody jumped off a bridge or anything, right?

Dieses "anything" ist wohl auf die Grundregel "Verneinung = any" zurückzuführen und nicht auf die Frage. Man könnte aber auch − subtiler Weise − argumentieren, dass es sich hier um eine Sonderfall einer erwarteten Zustimmung handelt. In solchen Fällen steht zwar eigentlich "some" (wie weiter oben ausgeführt), weil der Sprecher etwas als gegeben annimmt. Hier jedoch nimmt der Sprecher etwas als NICHT gegeben an ⇒ daher (ausnahmsweise) "any". Gemeint ist jedenfalls: "Es ist also gar nichts passiert, oder?"

Interessant ist es, die Alternative zu analysieren: Nobody jumped off a bridge or something, right? Wer dieses "something" mit der erwarteten bejahenden Antwort erklärt, liegt hier vermutlich falsch, weil, wie im Absatz zuvor oben ausgeführt, die Bestätigung einer Negation zu "anything" führen würde. Passender ist wohl die Erklärung mit der Verdeutlichung von "jumped off a bridge": "Es ist doch wohl niemand von einer Brücke gesprungen oder hat sonstigen Unfug getrieben?" / "Es ist doch wohl niemand von einer Brücke gesprungen oder hat sonst irgendwie Selbstmord begangen?" Eine weitere Interpretationsmöglichkeit würde "or something" nur auf "bridge" alleine beziehen: "Es ist doch wohl niemand von einer Brücke oder einem Felsen oder einem hohen Baum etc. gesprungen?"

4. Der Punkt 2. beschäftigte sich nur mit Entscheidungsfragen ("ja" oder "nein"?), in denen "or something" zur Präzisierung verwendet wird. Grundsätzlich gilt das aber auch für Ergänzungsfragen:

What if someone walks in a polling location with a backpack bomb or something?

Dieses "something" bezieht sich nicht auf den ganzen Satz, also aufs Hereinspazieren, sondern auf eine Alternative zu einer Bombe = Präzisierung.

What if Rizzi had cheated on a test or something?

Hier geht es um die Art und Weise eines Betruges oder einer sonstigen Untat = Präzisierung.

"But what if we got hurt or something?" asked Alice.

Hier geht es um die nähere Bestimmung einer möglichen Bedrohung.

Ende des 2. Exkurses

2.3. "Or anything" in Konditionalsätzen:

She could knock back a pint with the best of us, but if you were in trouble or unhappy or anything, she would sort you out.

{I can't work in the front room, 'cause we try and keep the front room ... nice. And then you've got somewhere to go, you know, if anybody comes unexpectedly or anything.}

He would call me if he needed a ride or anything.

Let me know if you change your mind or anything.

If you feel low in spirit or confidence or anything, if you feel you are unable to make decisions in a complicated relationship, if you always feel you are projected as the culprit, then it's a red flag.

Analog zum Punkt 2. im Exkurs 2 über Fragesätze (siehe weiter oben) finden wir auch hier die Möglichkeit, ungeachtet eines Konditionalsatzes "or something" und nicht "or anything" zu verwenden, um eine Präzisierung auszudrücken; auch in Konditionalsätzen scheint sich die englische Sprache hier zwei Möglichkeiten offen zu halten:

I remember thinking that I would have been mad if I, for instance, had bought the Touch in <u>an airport or something</u> and wanted to start browsing the internet and downloading stuff to it right away.

If I was covering stop signs or something, that would be a problem.

If you had a problem or something, she would always be there.

If you came up with some really interesting paper that was spurred by taking some really interesting drug — magic mushrooms or something — that would make more sense to me.

If I'd spent the past five years living in a monastery or something, I would come to the same conclusion.

Even if I were on TV or something – who would know?

If we called them 'the Edwards family' or something, it would feel, I don't know, fake.

If she had to die suddenly, or get shot or something, she would rather die in church.

If you want to write a new song about my body getting burned up into ashes or <u>digested by worms or something</u>, that would work, too.

It would be good to have him in my corner, because if I'm having an issue or something, he would help me out.

If you're <u>a secret agent or something</u>, this would be a sweet thing to have.

Why don't you go out and get yourself a job as a dishwasher or something?

Couldn't they have shot his tires, or his leg or something?

Couldn't you change your name or something?" asked Betty.

"Do you need a team photo or something?" asked one of the coaches. "We already have the official team photos," Durant replied.

"Can't you use some oranges, or tennis balls or something?" asked Tess.

"Why don't you go and have a coffee, or something," suggested Grandad.

"How about having that skin, to make a belt or something?" suggested Bluff.

"How about a tax break, or something?" suggested another.

"Why don't you go out to – out to Greenwich or something?" suggested Richard.

Could we have a spanner or a hammer or something?

"Can I get a drink of water or something?" she asked, sounding irritated that I had forgotten the fundamentals of salon hospitality.

Will you get me a sandwich or something?

"Awe damn, can I get a plate a saucer or something," asked Russell who was stuffing his mouth with candy.

"So is there a waiting room or something?" asked Sandstorm. "Yes, come with me," said the guard with a sigh.

"Hey, can I get some advil [= Schmerzmedikament] or something?" asked Jeff.

3. Neben "or something" gibt es selbstverständlich auch die Phrase "or something like that":

3.1. Anstatt Nomen / Pronomen:

He has got some twopenny-halfpenny job at Alexandria – sanitary officer or something like that.

I wanted to put on a video of some old Tom & Jerry cartoon or something like that.

Every once in a while, they would give me some fresh eggs or fruit, or something like that.

You should get a blanket or a sleeping bag or something like that.

As this product dries clear it would be great for an aquarium or something like that.

They might call it hooey or something like that.

Call it a cloud or something like that.

It was as if they all thought it was because the pilot was wearing a red shirt or something like that.

What if babies simply like the color red or prefer squares or something like that?

It's because of black crime, or something like that.

He might start crying or something like that.

Overzealousness can lead to the entire forest getting destroyed, or something like that.

3.3. Anstatt Adjektiv bzw. "adjectival phrase":

They found it too folksy or something like that.

If you overdo it, it will look too red or too violet or something like that.

The funny thing is that when you draw it, it won't come out perfect, and will most likely come out uneven or something like that.

Presumably we meant "entrenched" or something like that.

It must have been around four o'clock or something like that.

My nose is broken or something like that.

The chairman of the board was sixty years old or something like that.

3.4. Anstatt Adverb bzw. "adverbial phrase":

{I, too, have a history of feeling suicidal. I wanted to say "sadly" or something like that but actually am not much ashamed of it, I couldn't prevent it and it's not a thing to blame yourself about.}

I suppose we'd be safe by early June or something like that.

If we are winning, before September or something like that, I will make a decision and I will stay.

I guess it was in August or something like that.

Also carry some money around, like in your shoe or something like that.

She replied, "It's the beginning," or something like that.

'A good artist borrows, a great artist steals' – or something like that.

He is going to an appointment or a meeting somewhere across town or something like that.

Say "Time to get up!" or something like that.

If you say no, they'll think you don't like them or something like that.

He lost control of the car, he made the turn too quickly or something like that.

We bought a book, How to Train a Dog Perfectly, or something like that, and began reading in earnest.

I expect to hear her say, "I understand you perfectly," or something like that.

It's not throbbing or anything like that.

It doesn't slide or flip or anything like that.

And you didn't stay in touch over the years, or anything like that?

I have not asked you to marry me, or anything like that.

I don't recall asking you out or anything like that.

Not that I ever heard him being dissatisfied or anything like that.

Bit of a surprise, but it's not like it was unfinished or anything like that.

Are the ingredients very expensive, or anything like that?

So I think it was OK, I don't think it was anything too unexpected or anything like that, it was alright.

Although I wouldn't call the food here unbelievable or anything like that, this place does do pretty well overall, although for us there were some things that were better than others.

Whether it is because the mother feels unprepared or anything like that, it is not fair to bring a new life into a world where they would not be loved or cared for.

My siblings and I had not been in the same place or anything like that since 2004 I believe.

4. Weitere Alternativen (zu "or something" bzw. "or something like that"):

4.1. "Something similar":

They put a penny into a slot machine to get a small bar of chocolate or something similar.

I found a banal subject of conversation, the charm of old Madrid or something similar. "Twenty bottles of wine, Chianti or something_similar," he ordered.

Avoid garlic, but try red wine or something similar.

So might everyone soon have a little black box, or something similar, in their car?

Sign off with the closing, "Yours faithfully," or something similar.

I would definitely put the word "unfortunately" or "sadly" or something similar in your notice to tip them off that this is a sensitive subject for you.

One more thing: never make a big deal if you are hit by a boat or something similar.

I tried logging in again with the valid methods but it said "user not found" or something similar to that.

Write R.I.P (Rest In Peace) on it or something similar.

This does not mean we are calling for a new 'mansion tax' or anything similar.

This crayon pigment idea is also useful if you ever make wax sculptures or anything similar.

However, I don't like people coming round to my house "for a drink" or anything similar.

Do not label her as "mean, annoying, parasitic," or anything similar.

She had never participated in a nude photo shoot before, or anything similar.

I knew from the beginning that if I went to the Hollywood studios or anything similar, that the censorship for this film would water it down or make it something other than it is.

Don't text her, Facebook her, or anything similar!

There was no "Shut up Mikel", or anything similar.

4.2. "Something close":

Those horns are covered in black leather, or something close.

The four-member panel, led by Sir Geoffrey Palmer, a former prime minister of New Zealand, appears with these words to raise the possibility of an execution or something close.

The dog looks to me like a fox terrier or something close.

It was eight o'clock or something close on a Monday evening.

Assemble rice soup milk and veggies, give it a stir in a 9 x 13 pan or something close.

Google says they're saving humanity, or something close. Have you yelled out a profanity when you thought the mic was off, or said, "Oh shoot," or something close as in walked your new boss?

There have been no side agreements, no side negotiations or anything close.

It is no surprise that the Orchestra of the Swan, based in the Civic Hall of Stratford-upon-Avon, England, is no Cleveland Orchestra or anything close.

There is no current "cybersecurity standard" or anything close.

These firms will not necessarily be 100 years old, or anything close: Google and Facebook aren't even corporate teenagers. Forgive me if the spelling is wrong, but, having tried a number of alternatives, nowhere could I find a definition of towsey, towsie, towzy or anything close.

4.3.1. "Something of the sort":

We are seen as gadgets or something of the sort.

There's nothing wrong with having a futures contract or something of the sort.

Usually, the boat is smaller – a cabin cruiser or something of the sort.

The train stopped once more and then he heard the music again, the same shake or twist or something of the sort, the same voices.

He explained his situation and asked if he could stay either there or in the bathhouse for a period of time, posing as a cousin or something of the sort.

I first meet Pamela Sanders in the late nineties, at a social-agency conference about the resettlement of Hmong refugees or something of the sort.

"I would get a small van, remove the back seat and place a mattress on the floor, get them an oxygen tube and drive them to Jordan pretending it was a car accident, or a cancer case, or something of the sort," he said.

The American Birth Control League was to have a harmless little exhibit depicting the felicities of small families, or something of the sort.

Isn't he at an agricultural college or something of the sort? (Saki)

Not that we'd reached a tacit agreement or anything of the sort.

The bank's chief executive confidently told investors that he had "no plans for any inorganic capital raisings or anything of the sort".

She has no degree in psychology or anything of the sort.

I would like to state that there were no arguments, bullying or anything of the sort that lead to this.

The real subject of the book is not feminism or sex or gender or anything of the sort; as far as I can see, it is a book about betrayal and fidelity.

Although under fire since his previous surge two months ago for all his self-aggrandizing exaggerations, he hasn't grown careful or bashful or anything of the sort.

She didn't say she was sorry or anything of the sort.

Oh, no, it doesn't end unhappily or anything of that sort.

We don't see any homes being taken over, or land being expropriated or anything of the sort.

He affirmatively turned the situation on its head, never once mentioning anything about careers being curtailed, retirement or anything of the sort.

4.3.2. "Something of the kind":

If we wish to stamp out child pornography, for example, it needs to be specified that when material is supplied on the Internet, an address is always given, a personal code <u>or something of the kind</u>, so that it is the supplier who is responsible.

I am looking for a blue vase or something of the kind.

I remember going up some steep steps; they must have been worn smooth by long use or something of the kind, for I could hardly keep my feet as I went up.

It's like a giant cauldron or something of the kind.

He's an accountant or something of the kind.

One might suppose that this means, "before the galaxies were formed," or something of the kind.

Even now, when she is asked whether she is a believer, she will answer "Not exactly" or "Not in the sense that believers mean it," or something of the kind.

I was not referring to the trade unions, or other political parties, or anything of the kind.

"This shouldn't be taken as a failure or a tragedy or anything of the kind," Mr. Blakeman said.

You're not going to see them, and you're not going to the East Side to visit a hospital or see a movie or anything of the kind.

Of course he's not a Nazi or a Nazi sympathizer or anything of the kind.

I was involved in no clashes or anything of the kind.

That's not to say I or any of my colleagues are climate change deniers or anything of that kind.

I think it is alarmist and worse to compare the Egyptian Muslim Brothers to Egyptian Jihad or Al Qaeda or anything of the kind.

She never for a minute suggests quitting at six o'clock or anything of the kind.

They must have taken her to the galley or somewhere.
